- On education: Libertarians believe in the separation of school and state. Throwing more money at the problem will not make it better.
- On the economy: Libertarians believe that government should keep its hands off the economy. The only role the state should have in the economy is in protecting private property. Cutting taxes, reducing the size of government would be a boon to the economy.
- On the environment: The worst polluter in this country is our government (seriously! Look it up!). Libertarians believe in making government responsible for its actions, we also believe that privatizing government land would solve our worse environmental problems.
- I'm a libertarian, but I don't want to waste my vote. Voting Libertarian is like buying a lottery ticket. And if we win, if we succeed... you win big. It will change your life forever.

My Principles

If elected, all of my activities in the senate, and all of my votes will be guided by the following principles

 Nobody has the right to initiate the use of force against anybody else. Government does not have this right either, and people cannot delegate this right to government since they don't have it in the first place.

In a more practical way, this principle translates into:

- No taxes. I will vote against any tax increases, in favor of any decreases and will propose the elimination of all taxes, one by one.
- Find better solutions for everything government is currently doing: private and local.
- Ensure that all legislation clearly states the measurements by which its success is to be judged, and that it gets automatically repealed if it is no longer effective, no longer needed or outdated.
- I believe that parents are much better at making decisions about their children's education than Sacramento politicians, I fully support private education.
- I will work to reduce the war on drugs and to make sure that our state defends medical marijuana users from federal police.
- I fully support the rights of individuals to protect their lives and property.
- I will work to hold government accountable for pollution in its land. And to encourage privatizing government owned land to improve the environment.
